TTR Worldview Catalogue

Below is the list, to date, of the TTRWVC, listed from more to less secular, with a short description. Then we put forth a few Bumper Sticker for you to analyze yourself.

The World's Most Famous Table Talk Radio Worldview Catalogue

- Bread Alone (Pane Solo, Materialism, What You See is What You Get)
 This worldview reduces reality to what can be measured. There is nothing spiritual, no God, angels or demons, or anything beyond stuff.
- The World is Getting Better, and I'm the Proof (Evolution)
 Similar to "Bread Alone," Evolutionists understand that there is nothing more than what can be measured, but they also understand that the world is constantly getting better through the process of natural selection. This also becomes politicized in the form of people shaping reality to match their ideology; a kind of gnostic re-creation of the world into our own image.
- Just Do It (Egocentricity, Self-Esteem, Hedonism, Epicureanism)
 This worldview sees the purpose of life as the maximization of pleasure and the minimization of suffering.
- Garbage In, Garbage Out (Karma, What Goes Around Comes Around)
 This worldview insists on justice, and interprets the world in terms of a great balancing of the scales. Always looking for things to equal out, the "Garbage In, Garbage Out" worldview might resort to reincarnation (a person's soul coming back in another creature with better or worse circumstances) in order to ensure things balance out in the end.
- Coexist: All Dog's Go to Heaven (Universalism)

 Everyone is saved, there is no wrath of God, no hell, no judgment. It's all good.
- God is a Super-Nice Guy
 Always happy, and he wants you to be happy too.
- Dynomite! Jeffersons (Movin' on up, to the top. Rick Warren: Good works here = reward in heaven.)

This worldview is a Christianized version of karma, "You'd better do good stuff to get a better spot in heaven."

- Fill in the Blank Jesus
 - In this worldview Jesus is whatever you want him to be: coach, encourager, buddy, but probably not the savior of sinners.
- Jesus is My Homecoming King

 "Christianity is a relationship, not a religion." A specific version of the "Fill in the Blank

 Jesus," this worldview understands Christianity as a personal relationship with Jesus. It

frames our problem not as sin but as "distance from God." Salvation, then, is drawing close to God, and this nearness is discerned through the secret "close to God" sense.

• A Little Less Conversation, A Little More Action (Pietism)

Pietism understands growth in good works as more important that right theology. Pietism, then, emphasizes the growth of good works part of the Christian life, and diminishes the joy of hearing the Gospel and the forgiveness of sins.
